I was ordained in 2009 and came back to my home Diocese of Armagh, (originally from Milltown Parish) serving my curacy in St. Columba's in Portadown with Canon Bill Adair, where I was also appointed as a 'Vicar', and then in 2013 became the Rector of Mullavilly.

Eddie and I celebrated our 30th Wedding Anniversary this year, and we have 3 grown up children, Andrew and his wife Rebecca, Christopher and his girlfriend Lauren and Rebecca who is engaged to be married to Jack in 2022, not forgetting our wee miniature schnauzer 'Archie'.

Having also celebrated 30 years of being in ministry this year, I look forward to the years ahead assisting the Archbishop and Archdeacon Terry Scott in the mission, ministry and vision of the Diocese of Armagh.
